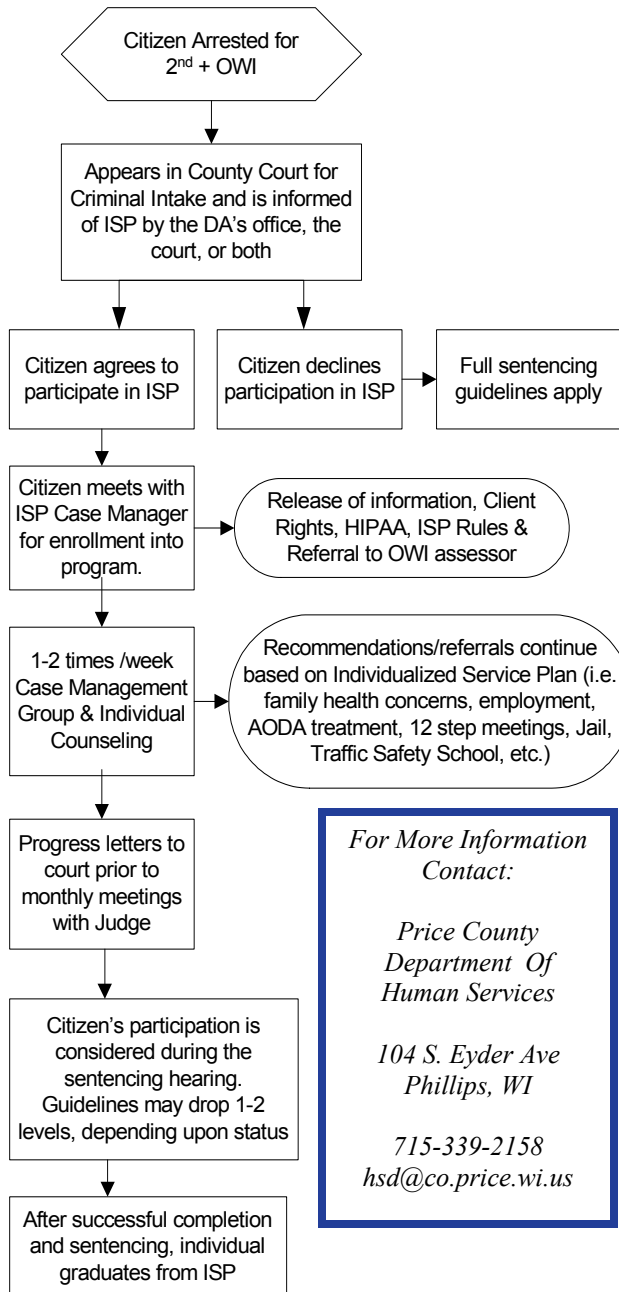

Price County Pretrial Intensive Supervision Program (ISP)

What is an Intensive Supervision Program?

Price County's **Intensive Supervision Program** (ISP) is designed to help people who have been charged with a second or higher Operating While Impaired or Under the Influence (OWI) offense to stop drinking and driving. The program is a combination of treatment and case management services. ISPs have proven to reduce OWI recidivism among those individuals who complete the program. Studies have also determined that when combined with case management, substance use/abuse treatment is more effective¹.

Who can participate in an ISP?

In order to be eligible to participate in Price County's ISP, the following criteria must be met:

- Resident of Price County; and
- Arrested for second (2nd) or subsequent OWI offense; and
- At least 18 years of age; and
- Free of a violent criminal charge such as, but not limited to: Battery; Mayhem; Disorderly Conduct involving violence; and
- Voluntarily agrees to enroll in the ISP program and abide by the ISP program rules; and
- Pays one-half the ISP program fee (\$75.00) at the time of admission to the program

Price County ISP Program Rules Checklist

Agree to participate.

There are benefits to participating in the program which may include case management services, assistance with finding and keeping a job, discounted AODA treatment costs, reduced fines and/or jail time, a chance to change your life.

Pay \$150.00 fee, due by the final hearing.

Only 1/2 the fee is due upon admission to the program. You may find that the program fee is offset by a reduction in fines and/or jail time, or through a discount in AODA treatment costs.

Do not consume, purchase or possess alcohol and/or illegal drugs while enrolled in the program.

Part of the success of an ISP is close monitoring of participants to ensure that they are maintaining sobriety while receiving treatment and services. Maintaining sobriety is a key factor in successful AODA treatment and stopping future OWI arrests.

Be available for random chemical tests ordered by your case manager and performed by local law enforcement.

Random chemical test helps determine if the program is working and helps keep you honest—to yourself and your provider— about your sobriety.

Complete an OWI assessment and participate in any of the recommendations made by the assessor which could include inpatient care and/or outpatient counseling.

This is a normal component of any OWI arrest, not just the ISP. However, if enrolled in the ISP, your recommended treatment may be less costly for you. If you have no insurance coverage and you complete the program, some of your treatment costs may be forgiven.

Follow through on appropriate referrals made by the assigned case manager.

*Your case manager is there to help you set goals and follow through on court-ordered obligations. He/she works with you to identify and work through life's stumbling blocks so your current OWI arrest is your **LAST** OWI arrest*

Attend all scheduled appointment with your case manager, OWI assessor, and other treatment providers. Some home visits may be performed.

Getting on track and staying on track is the key to successful change. Your appointments are designed to help you gain control over your life. Keeping all of your appointments is important to improve your chance of success.

Attend and participate in a weekly 12-step program (AA) or other approved support group.

Support groups and programs such as AA have a proven track record of improving successful recovery and continued sobriety. They provide you with an avenue of emotional support and internal strength long after you graduate from the Intensive Supervision Program.

Allow interagency communication for reporting progress and ensuring quality.

*In order to make sure you are getting the best and most effective services and to improve your chances of your current OWI being your **LAST** OWI, your team (case manager, Judge, counselors, etc.) must be able to communicate about how you are doing. You will sign an authorization that allows them to do so.*

During the years of 2003-2007, Price County ranked 18th in the state for OWI convictions, with a total of 696.

In 2007, there were 125 OWI arrests, in Price County;— 48% were 2nd offense greater
