Madison, WI – Wisconsin's Federal Nominating Commission, charged with making recommendations for vacancies in federal judgeships and U.S. attorney positions, is accepting applications for a vacancy on the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Wisconsin. The opening resulted when U.S. District Court Judge Rudolph Randa announced in 2016 that he was taking senior status and subsequently passed away. U.S. Sens. Ron Johnson and Tammy Baldwin have re-established the commission as of September 16, 2019.

The commission seeks qualified candidates for appointment to the vacancy.
