# Advocacy & Access to Justice: Advancing State Bar Priorities

The budget process is moving forward as Wisconsin legislative leaders build the biennial budget. The Government Relations (GR) team continues to focus on making sure that State Bar priorities are included in the GOP controlled budget – such as increased civil legal aid – or are otherwise addressed in separate legislation, like expungement reform.

The GR team is working closely with legal providers and other advocates to ensure that leaders in the legislature's Joint Finance Committee understand the depth of need for expanded civil legal aid funding exacerbated by the effects of COVID-19. State Bar members are encouraged to help the process by contacting their lawmakers about the topic.

Expungement reform, AB 69/SB 78, received public hearings in both the Assembly and Senate. This would allow judges more flexibility to grant an expungement after a sentence was completed. The bill enjoys robust support from the business community, police associations, criminal justice community, and even organizations on opposite ends of the ideological spectrum. At the Senate hearing, nearly 20 organizations and individuals testified on the bill – all in support. President Kathy Brost and President-elect Cheryl Daniels recently testified in support of the bills AB 69 and SB 78, which still needs committee approval and recommendation before they can be considered for a floor vote in their respective chambers.

# What You Can Do

As the biennial budget moves through the legislature, the State Bar encourages you to contact your legislators and ask them to prioritize funding for our legal system. Use the State Bar Advocacy Network to send messages of support to your representatives.

# Continuing Our Work on Racial Justice, Diversity & Inclusion

The Racial Justice Task Force, led by Past President Jill Kastner, is examining ways the State Bar can effectively use its resources to combat racial injustice and disparities, advance equal justice, and promote diversity and inclusion in the Wisconsin legal community. The task force last met on April 14. Here is an overview of its work:

- Mandatory CLE on Diversity, Inclusion and Bias: The task force discussed responses from Board of Governors and other members, and decided that mandatory CLE training is a priority and a vital step for addressing racial inequities and working to eliminate bias in our systems. Many other industries, trades, and professions are mandating such education. For instance, Missouri, and Iowa recently added DEI and Wellness as part of its mandatory CLE requirements. Missouri requires one credit each reporting period. Iowa added DEI and Wellness as part of the required two credits. Kansas is working on a similar proposal. Illinois and Minnesota also require this training.
- **Racial Justice for Low-income Wisconsinites:** In March, Kastner met with the Civil Legal Aid Alliance of Wisconsin, an association of legal aid associations and allies, to discuss better statewide coordination on access to justice and racial justice initiatives, with a focus on the undeserved communities and building race equity.
- **Expungement Clinic in Kenosha:** The task force discussed the importance of working with community partners while hosting an in-person Expungement Clinic on Sept. 21, held prior to the Board of Governors' Leadership Orientation. This is an opportunity for governors and other State Bar leaders to put words into action. It is also an opportunity to draw the public's and elected officials' attention to the importance of amending Wisconsin's expungement laws to make them more fair and accessible to marginalized communities.
- **Task Force Wraps Up by June 30:** The task force is working on its final report, along with possible recommendations for continuing efforts that are not completed by June 30.

# FACILITATE – Helping the Public Access the Legal System

#### Pro Bono: Connecting the Legal Community with Opportunities

- Wills for Heroes This pro bono program continues to use a virtual free legal clinic model. First responders and volunteer lawyers coordinated by Foley & Lardner are working together via email and videoconferencing to complete basic estate plans. From July 1, 2020, to March 29, 2021, volunteer members completed more than 125 estate plans for first responders statewide. The most recent clinics were held in March to assist 36 first responders in Iowa and Sauk counties.
- Wills for Healthcare Heroes With permission from the national Wills for Heroes Foundation, volunteers from Quarles & Brady LLP expanded the Wills for Heroes project to serve health care workers on the front lines of the pandemic. Volunteers held their first virtual estate planning clinic in February for health care support workers at Aurora Sinai Medical Center in Milwaukee. Additional clinics are in the works.
- **Pro Bono Portal** Since the State Bar Pro Bono Portal launched in late November 2020, 19 legal services agencies have joined the website, 176 total volunteer opportunities have been posted, with 74 active listings. The website provides an easy way for volunteers to find and connect with pro bono opportunities.
- **Pro Bono Honor Society** The Wisconsin Pro Bono Honor Society recognized 266 lawyers who certified that, in 2020, they performed at least 50 hours of qualifying pro bono work to help low-income clients. They are recognized on the Wisconsin Access to Justice Commission's website, in State Bar publications, and through local bar association events.

#### Access to Justice Commission: Expanding Help to the Unrepresented

The Access to Justice Commission, created by the Wisconsin Supreme Court at the request of the State Bar, works to expand access to the civil justice system for unrepresented low-income Wisconsin residents. Here are a few of its projects:

• State Funding for Civil Legal Aid – The commission continues to work with civil legal aid stakeholders to increase Wisconsin's state budget appropriation for civil legal services. Volunteers and staff from the State Bar Government Relations Team, the Wisconsin Trust Account Foundation, and newly formed Civil Legal Aid Alliance of Wisconsin are

working to educate legislators, especially those on the Joint Finance Committee, about the need for and the return on investment from an increased state budget appropriation for civil legal aid in Wisconsin.

- Wisconsin Free Legal Answers, the commission's signature pro bono effort, now has 330 registered volunteers. Volunteer lawyers have responded to more than 700 civil legal questions between Jan. 1 and May 19, including 288 family law, 81 tenant/landlord, 75 consumer debt, 55 employment, 23 real estate, and 22 probate questions.
- Wisconsin Law Help Website The commission continues working collaboratively with the State Bar's Legal Assistance Committee, the State Law Library, WisTAF, and others to develop an easy to use website where Wisconsin residents can search for and connect with appropriate legal resources that fit their circumstances and legal issues. The group has developed its project description and is now working on its governance and staffing model as well as funding. The project is inspired by similar legal help websites that exist in Illinois, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota, and most other states.

#### **Resolving Client Disputes**

The State Bar's Fee Arbitration Program, a confidential and inexpensive way for clients and lawyers to resolve fee disputes, currently has 40 open cases. In the last 12 months, the program has opened 64 cases and closed 61. Arbitration hearings continue to be held via videoconference.

Through its statewide media outreach and response efforts, the State Bar provides information, corrects inaccurate reporting, connects the media with lawyers as experts on a variety of issues, and serves as a trusted resource to journalists while highlighting the critical role and expertise lawyers play in society. # LRIS: Connecting Attorneys to Clients

The State Bar of Wisconsin Lawyer Referral and Information Service (LRIS) connects attorneys with clients who are carefully

prescreened for legal issue, geographic location, and ability to pay. More than 375 lawyers serve on the LRIS panel, covering 40 practice areas. Panel members are needed that are bilingual.

From July 1, 2020, to May 18, 2021, LRIS specialists responded to 27,287 calls from the public. Approximately 1 in 4 callers are referred to an attorney; the remaining callers receive general information, are referred to community or government agencies, or offered basic legal advice through the State Bar's Lawyer Hotline.

The LRIS program continues to experience an increase in Spanish speaking referrals and are in need of Spanish-speaking attorneys. To learn more or register as a panelist, visit the Lawyer Referral and Information Service webpage on wisbar.org.





A new billboard promoting the State Bar's Lawyer Referral & Information Service was placed in April on I-41 between Milwaukee and Appleton. In the last two years, LRIS staff members have prescreened more than 61,000 calls for our panel members, generating more than \$4.5 million in attorney fees from these referrals.

#### Diversity Clerk Program Collaborates with WAAL to Develop Soft Skills Workshop

# State Bar Improves Pro Hac Vice Process

On July 1, 2019, the State Bar began administering the Pro Hac Vice (PHV) process. Out-of-state attorneys were to submit their PHV application to the State Bar. The State Bar was responsible for making sure the applications were forwarded to the Office of Lawyer Regulation, and for properly distributing the normal PHV fee of \$250 to the respective parties, including the OLR (\$50), WisTAF (\$100), and the Access to Justice Commission (\$100). This was a labor intensive process.

Earlier this year, the State Bar IT Team worked to create an online application process with credit card transaction capability. In consideration of the work completed to improve the process and provide ongoing administrative oversight and service to the Court, a new revised fee structure, endorsed unanimously by the Justices, as approved and becomes effective June 1, 2021. WisTAF and the ATJC will received \$100 each, and the OLR and State Bar will receive \$25 each to help cover administrative costs.

# Seeking Solutions to Sexual Harassment in the Legal Profession

In 2019, the State Bar Board of Governors adopted the recommendations of the President's Working Group on Sexual Harassment and the Legal Profession Report. Since then, State Bar President Kathy Brost appointed the **Anti-Sexual Harassment Oversite Group** and the group began meeting in FY21.

The group will formulate a basic model policy for legal employers addressing sexual harassment in the legal workplace, create a list of resources for wisbar.org, and collect and study data on sexual harassment in the legal workplace.
